

Mars: Our Future on the Red Planet

The next frontier in space exploration is Mars, and human habitation of Mars isn't much farther off. Now the National Geographic Channel looks to the future with *Mars*, a six-part series documenting and dramatizing the next 25 years as humans land on and learn to live on Mars. This companion book to the series explores the science behind the mission and the challenges awaiting those brave individuals. This fascinating book will take you millions of miles away and decades into the future to our next home in the solar system.

Leonard David has been reporting on space exploration for over five decades. Throughout those years, his writings have appeared in numerous websites, newspapers, magazines and books, such as the *Financial Times, Foreign Policy, Private Air, Sky and Telescope, Astronomy*, SPACE.com and *Space News* newspaper, as well as *Aerospace America* and in supplemental writing for *Aviation Week & Space Technology* magazine.

Mr. David has been a consultant to NASA, other government agencies and the aerospace industry. In the mid-1980's he served as Director of Research for the National Commission on Space, a U.S. Congress/White House study that appraised the next 50 to 100 years of space exploration. 
Book Club Meets Science Cafe

The camera can help you do things like find heat leaks in home insulation and windows, find cold air drafts, and check your water heater and furnace for leaks.


It connects to your iPhone, iPad, or android smart phone.

Storytimes

Storytime at the Nederland Library is focused on a holistic approach to literacy. From our youngest patrons to our friends getting ready for preschool, kindergarten and beyond, we look at strengths and interests that our children come to us with and work to strengthen all skills through language concepts and contextually relevant activities.

<u>Movers and Shakers</u>: *Wednesdays 10:30-11:00 am* (best for children 2 and younger)

As children acquire language skills and concepts, we strive to incorporate many fun topics and socially supportive lessons. While we want our children to be exposed to literacy topics and concepts, it is also very important to understand the developmental milestones our children meet. This is a holistic approach to educating children in a safe, fun and engaging environment.

<u>Read, Play, Grow:</u> *Thursdays 10:30-11:15 am* (best for children 2 1/2 and older)

This program will explore the more complex sides of literacy including phonemic awareness, letter symbol recognition, and strategies such as prediction and inferring. Our goal here is to take fun stories and look a bit deeper into other concepts within the story. We also strive to extend the concepts so that there are several chances to explore not only the ideas and concepts but materials as well.
